

# A message from Rev Sarah...

Dear friends,

During the month of August, Morningside United Church will be hosting the *Spirit Justice* exhibition by artist and retired United Reformed Church Minister, the Revd Elizabeth Gray-King. Elizabeth describes on her website,

"The Spirit-Justice tour is my new exhibition series that started in Exeter in March 2024, ending in Edinburgh in August 2024. The paintings on show depict images which call for justice alongside images which speak of the power of God's Spirit to respond to that injustice."

Elizabeth understands herself as a visual theologian meaning that she sees her faith and how that responds to politics and the events of life rather than thinking it.

Immediately prior to the exhibition opening here, it has been displayed in Aberdeen hosted as a joint project by Aberdeen Methodist and United Reformed Churches. Because Aberdeen URC does not have its own building, and the Methodist church building while located in the city centre is rather tucked away, the decision was taken to host the exhibition in an empty shop in one of the shopping centres in order to enable more people from the wider community engage with the work if they chose to do so.

It has been fascinating to see who is willing to cross the threshold of a shop and look at the paintings. People from all walks of life. People who have come into the exhibition because they are interested in art, or justice, or the other themes highlighted. People who are at a loose end in the city, either chronically or unusually so and who pop into the shop because doing so is a pleasant way to pass a little time. Waiting can feel less onerous if there is something to do while doing so!

What has caught my attention is how the exhibition has enabled conversations to happen between church folk and people from the wider community who not only would never or rarely cross the threshold of church premises, but who are willing to be drawn into or even initiate a conversation about faith and spiritual matters. Who find themselves willing to step back, pause, and consider their own response to the injustices of our world and what sort of person they want to be as they consider that response.

One of the reasons that the Kirk Session has agreed to host the Spirit Justice exhibition is to offer a space for these sorts of conversations in our community. We might ponder what exactly is the purpose of church and faith in our time, and to some extent this is part of the answer. We ponder what we are able to offer to our community, some of which is shared with other partners of good will and some of which is more uniquely ours. We are able to offer physical space for groups to meet; our buildings host a variety of the sorts of groups one might expect to see: music and exercise groups, children's and young people's organisations, our own coffee mornings and other events one might expect. Beyond that are gathering activities that might be thought of in some quarters as less usual: the Peace Garden and the Spiders making the camouflage nets for Ukraine. Others too might be surprised to learn of our relationship with the Romanian Orthodox Church in Edinburgh in a time when different church traditions can be perceived as being opposed to each rather than actually having more in common than separates us.

But back to the exhibition. Here is a means for us to talk with our community. Hopefully curiosity will bring all sorts of our neighbours in from the road to see the paintings. Hopefully this will be received as an invitation to think, feel and look. I wonder too if the experience of hosting the paintings will change us, probably not in a way that looks so different to how we operate now, but in a way that reframes our understanding of ourselves, our God and our neighbours. Here we provide, as we always do, but this time in a particular way, an

opportunity to speak about what we truly value, both as individuals and as community.

## Musings From Mary Taylor, Pastoral Assistant, MUC

Well what a lovely time we are having just now in Morningside United Church linked to Eric Liddell 100 and connecting more with global visitors from the World Church!

During June we welcomed and hosted Blanka, a Polish intern from Coventry Cathedral linked to the Community of the Cross of Nails. It was Blanka's first time in Edinburgh and Scotland.

As well as being a tourist around Edinburgh seeing Wojtek, the Polish bear in Princes Street Gardens and Greyfriars Bobby, the faithful Scottish dog, Blanka learnt about Eric Liddell and the Eric Liddell Community and asked a lot of questions about Scottish churches and history. She also kindly planted the border of golden begonias you can see as you enter the Eric Liddell peace garden. These beautiful flowers help us to remember the story of Eric Liddell's gold medal in Paris in 1924, exactly 100 years ago on 11 July.

During Carers' Week Fi Brown, from the Eric Liddell Community gave Blanka and myself the chance to have a most enjoyable trip along the canal from Polwarth Church. Canal trips cater for up to 11 people. Would anyone in Morningside United Church like to go on such a leisurely, canal trip? Please speak to me if you are interested.

The final highlight of Blanka's trip was going to Marygate House, Holy Island. Marygate House is an international partner of the Community of the Cross of Nails.

On Saturday 22 June some of us were privileged to attend the very special Eric Liddell 100 service in St Giles and we really appreciated Rev Lindsey Sanderson's sermon. Princess Royal and Patricia Russell, Eric's oldest daughter read the lessons from Scripture.

It was a great delight to welcome Patricia and Mervyn Russell and Sue Caton, Eric's niece to worship on the Sunday, to spend time with them in Morningside United Church and in the Eric Liddell peace garden.

They appreciated how much it had changed in a year thanks to our hard-working gardening team.

On 11 July MUC welcomed 2 performances of Rich Swingle's play, Beyond the Chariots, a one man play when Rich told Eric's story using 10-12 voices. Remarkable performances!

#### **Looking ahead - dates for diary:**

25 July to 12 September

The Eric Liddell - Legacy of an Olympic Legend Exhibition, as part of the Eric 100 exhibition series will be held in the Scottish Parliament. There is no charge.

In the midst of all this activity this summer let us remember the words of Eric's favourite hymn:

"Be still my soul: the Lord is on your side; bear patiently the cross of grief or pain; leave to your God to order and provide; in every change he faithful will remain."

#### **Beyond Chariots**

The one-man play *Beyond Chariots* on 11 July brought some distant visitors. Leslie Freitag from Harpenden in Hertfordshire made the long journey to see the play. He brought with him some large photo prints of Chinese locations associated with Eric Liddell, and kindly gifted them to MUC, and also some to Rich Swingle who performed the play. These are now on boards under the window in the sanctuary with brief captions. Leslie explained that these were taken when he and his wife Linda visited China in 2013.

#### His own words continue below:

The visit was at the end of a long study tour following the footsteps of George Hogg (from Harpenden) and Rewi Alley (from New Zealand) who were much respected Europeans doing good work in the country. Hogg organised evacuation of over 50 teenage boys from advancing Japanese army - his actions, like those of Eric, were subjects of two

movies *The Children of Huang Shi* and *Ocean Devil*. Hogg died in 1945 in China, one wonders if he and Eric's paths crossed? Huge country but identical time periods.



The memorial to Eric was the best kept in our entire tour, looking at the web apparently it is now regarded as very important by the Chinese government. After all, based on birthplace, he was their first Olympic medal winner. At one time, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission had the memorial as the sole Commonwealth grave in China.

We added Weifang to our trip due to the family connection. Eric was related to my granny - Liddell her middle name. She only mentioned it a few days before

her death, telling Linda that she had seen a film that afternoon in the care home about Wee Eric! (*Chariots of Fire*) She finished by saying "I told you there were good runners in the family!" Somewhat of an understatement!
